## Industrialist dies at 68

He was a partner in the operation of the Di-Mo Tool and Development Co. of Middleboro for many years.

He was also a breeder and raiser of Greyhound dogs in this city and in Florida. He bred and raised the first local dog to win the Gold Collar Award at the Taunton Dog Track.

He was a life member of the Taunton Elks Lodge No. 150 and held memberships in the Portuguese American Civic Club, the National Greyhound Association, the Northeastern University Alumni Association and the THS Class of 1933 Scholarship Foundation.
